#### Dear ALLUNY Members,

Warm greetings to you in March 2025! ALLUNY had a busy and productive 2024 and I thank each individual who contributed to these efforts. I am especially grateful to **Jessica Petitto** for serving as President and **Nina Scholtz** and **Debbie Simonik** for serving on the Executive Board 2023-2025. I also thank **Olli Baker** for stepping in to fill the remainder of Debbie Simonik's Board term; **Lisa Worhacz** for her work as long-time Newsletter Editor; **Kristin Neri** and **Christine Demetros** for accepting Vice-President and Board positions; **Tom Hemstock** for agreeing to serve as chair of the Membership Committee; **Melissa Sievers** for taking on the role of Newsletter Editor; and **Chris Lund** for joining that committee.

Our 2024 Spring Institute, *Eclipsing Inequality: The Librarian's Role in Advancing Social Justice*, presented numerous paths to assist underserved populations and promote access to justice. The 2024 Annual Meeting, *Pioneering AI from Classrooms to Courtrooms*, was very well attended and speakers shared significant insights on tools and ethical considerations concerning AI use in various arenas.

Our archives were relocated from Rochester to Albany Law thanks to **Rob Cunningham** and Clarice Affronti, an enterprising and accommodating Albany Law student. Albany Law has agreed to house our records and **Lisa Suto** will manage this repository, which also includes two boxes of historical material returned to us from LLMC. Meanwhile, **Chris Lund** and I updated the Meeting Manual to reflect all the changes we have seen during the last five years.

We hosted several 2024 librarian gatherings. Our June 12<sup>th</sup> Happy Hour was purely a social event and at our Sept. 11<sup>th</sup> Lunch & Learn, we discussed AI from different perspectives based on law school, court, and law firm library perspectives. Our Holiday Lunch & Learn/ Send-off for **Elaine Knecht's** retirement on December 5<sup>th</sup> was festive, celebratory, and a touch bittersweet.

Member Nichole McCarthy of Cornell's Legal Information Institute ("LII") has recently had an update to her job title and responsibilities. She has submitted the below description describing her current role:

"In November of 2024 my title changed from Original Content Collections Manager to Director of Student Research and Content Development. This was intended to be a more accurate description of my role and responsibilities at the LII, but was also the result of growing collections and additional responsibility.

Since I started with the LII in April of 2021 (happy 4 years to me), I primarily oversaw Wex, the LII's free legal dictionary and encyclopedia. I was tasked with hiring and overseeing law students who write the content, growing and adding new collections, and finding new ways to organize that content.

In March of 2024, I held the LII's first hackathon to answer the question "how would you organize the content in Wex?" We are still working through all of the incredible feedback we received during this event and plan to implement some of the winning suggestions.

Since then I have created a mortuary law collection and a Wex QA team. The Wex OA is a team of undergraduate students who review Wex entries and flag content that they believe should be reviewed by the Wex Definitions Team (the law students). This was created with the intent of improving the quality of the content in Wex and to provide undergraduate students with research experience.

In November of 2024 I acquired the responsibility of the Women & Justice Collection. Originally the Avon Global Center for Women & Justice, this database was acquired by the LII in 2017, and operated as The Women & Justice Collection (WJC) through 2024. In 2025, this was renamed The Gender Justice Collection with the intent of being more inclusive and the goal of expanding the collection. Historically, the Gender Justice Collection has had a heavy focus on international law. We intend to maintain that focus while adding a new section on U.S. Resources by State to the landing page; I hired a team to begin that work in January.

Additionally, I am still in the very early, but active planning stage of creating an "Annotated Deleted Directory" of all deleted federal webpages. This project will be a nod to the efforts of all the web archivists who have been saving these resources all along. The plan is to provide links, organized by agency, to the archived version of the original webpage, the archived version of the deleted or censored page, and a very brief write up of the changes and when they occurred. More on that soon!'

#### New Business

- Karen Oesterle attended Debbie Simonik's funeral to express condolences and gratitude on behalf of ALLUNY.

## **LEGAL TECH RECAP**

Once again, AI seems to be everywhere, and legal tech is no exception! As usual, I've started with spotlighting the latest updates from legal tech tools and platforms. I've then zoomed out in the last section for a look at some big-picture GenAI news.

As always, please let me know if there are any new topics/trends/tools that you would like to see included in future updates.

#### **Bloomberg Law**

In January, Bloomberg Law <u>launched</u> two new GenAl tools (in beta): <u>Bloomberg Law Answers</u> and <u>Al Assistant</u>. Bloomberg Law Answers creates brief responses directly in search results with specific citations to different components of each answer, pulling from court opinions, practical guidance, and other key sources. Al Assistant is a chat-based, document-specific tool that appears in a side panel when viewing sources, allowing users to generate summaries and ask targeted questions about the documents they are viewing.

Bob Ambrogi <u>highlighted</u> that both tools prioritize source attribution by incorporating footnotes within their answers, specifying the origin of each part of the response. On a <u>recent episode</u> of *The Geek in Review* podcast, Bloomberg Law's Chief Product Officer emphasized that these new tools represent a broader application of GenAl within their platform.

#### **ContractPod AI**

In fall 2024, <u>ContractPod AI</u> introduced <u>Leah</u> <u>Intelligence</u>, a contract review solution that leverages GenAI to enhance contract assessment and risk mitigation and to allow users to tailor specific contract language, use cases, and industryspecific regulations. Discussing the new features on a recent <u>The Geek in Review podcast episode</u>, Atena Reyhani, Chief Product Officer, explained that Leah Intelligence not only positions ContractPodAI as a leader in generative AI for contract lifecycle management but also extends its capabilities to broader enterprise applications, including compliance, obligation management, and entity analysis.

### **Hercules** AI

HerculesAI (formerly ZERO) has launched Verify, an AI-powered legal billing compliance tool designed to help law firms detect and correct billing issues. A standout feature of *Verify* is its ability to process outside counsel guidelines and firm billing policies without requiring manual rule creation. Ambrogi <u>covered</u> the launch of Verify, noting that it helps firms stay on top of compliance at multiple stages—when time is recorded, after it's submitted, and during the pre-bill review process.

#### Lexis

Lexis made legal tech headlines with the launch of <u>Protégé</u>, its new "personalized AI assistant." Protégé is a big step up in LexisNexis's AI tools, allowing users to draft full transactional documents and litigation filings, analyze complex contracts, and even generate visual case timelines. It plugs in with document management systems like iManage and NetDocuments, so it can personalize output based on a lawyer's role, writing style, and preferred jurisdictions and can link citations back to source materials for verification.

Ambrogi <u>pointed out</u> that "[a]t the core of the Protégé release is its use of 'agentic Al' – technology that can autonomously complete tasks based on user goals, including reviewing its own work and identifying areas for improvement. The launch was also covered in <u>Artificial Lawyer</u>, the <u>Geek in Review</u> <u>podcast</u>, and <u>Law.com</u>.

#### NeosAl

On February 5, Assembly Software unveiled enhancements to <u>NeosAl</u>, the GenAl-powered features within its <u>Neos case management</u> platform. Ambrogi reported on the updates, including a <u>How</u> <u>It Works</u> video demonstration that offers a hands-on look at the new capabilities.

#### Trellis

In November 2024, <u>Trellis</u> introduced <u>Trellis AI</u>, a suite of GenAI tools that leverages its state trial court database. The new tools include motion drafting, case assessment, and legal research. Ambrogi <u>reported</u> on the launch, noting that "Trellis AI is drawing from an extensive database of court filings, which seems to have the potential to be particularly powerful." Legal Tech Hub also covered the Trellis AI news in its <u>January Legal Tech briefing</u>.

#### **Wolters Kluwer**

In the last newsletter, I covered the new GenAl features added to <u>VitalLaw</u>. VitalLaw was also the focus of the January <u>CRIV semiannual call</u> <u>with Wolters Kluwer</u>, which focused on its core features, including the Practical Content platform, new support resources, and recently introduced Hot Topics, available on selected practice area dashboards.

#### THINGS YOU SHOULD CHECK OUT

#### DeepResearch

On February 2, OpenAl introduced Deep Research, a tool for generating complex, detailed reports with up-to-date information. Initially available only to Pro users, it is set to expand to Pro and Team users in the future. The launch made headlines, from the <u>New York Times</u> to <u>Bloomberg</u>. Many commentators have been testing the tool, including experiments by Ambrogi, who used it to compile a compendium of legal ethics opinions on GenAl and to identify the best small firm law practice management tools. A detailed review on *The Verge* examined how it handled a legal query, highlighting its ability to generate structured legal summaries with real cases, while noting its limitations, such as missing key recent developments and requiring human oversight to ensure accuracy. For a comparison of how it performed against three other AI research tools, check out the **Digital Digging** blog.

#### DeepSeek & Local AI

Another headline grabbing launch that made waves in the stock market was the January 29 release of DeepSeek R1, an open-source GenAI model from Chinese AI research company DeepSeek. It captured widespread interest for delivering performance comparable to leading AI models at a fraction of the cost. Greg Lambert discussed its potential impact on legal tech in a recent 3 Geeks and a Law Blog post, noting that DeepSeek R1 can run locally-on individual computers or in secure on-premises environments-giving the potential for secure, on-premises AI in law firms and corporate legal departments. He also flagged concerns about the model's Chinese origins, potential security risks, and regulatory issues, leaving it up to legal tech professionals to decide whether it's a "gamechanger or just another flash in the pan."

Josh Kubicki underscored the growing importance of local AI in a recent <u>Brainyacts post</u>, explaining that locally run AI can keep data private and allow for customization without relying on cloud-based services. He stressed the need to understand its potential for enhancing efficiency on legal tasks while also addressing security, compliance, and ethical concerns.
